### History

Myth, Mystery & Mayhem - Richard III, The Princes in the
Tower & Bosworth.
Thursdays 10.30-12.30
Starts 1st May
(Dr Mark Barnard)
4-week course £36.00

Last seen in July 1483 after being lodged in the Tower by their paternal uncle and regent the future Richard III, the fate of the Princes in the Tower - the deposed twelve year-old king <a href="Edward V of England">Edward V of England</a> and his younger brother, <a href="Richard of Duke of York">Richard of Duke of York</a> - has been a mystery.

It is generally assumed that they were murdered, but were they really killed and by who? Posterity held Shakespeare's "poisonous hunchbacked toad", Richard III, was responsible. Join Dr Mark Barnard to discover just how 'misshapen' and 'wicked' Richard III really was along with what led to his death at Bosworth.



Discovering Victorian Nottingham.

During Victorian times Nottingham grew into a major industrial city. It became famous for its hosiery and lace industries but it also became known for its back-to-back houses in Narrow and Broad Marsh. Overcrowded parts of the city suffered from poor sanitation, ill-health and disease. Local history author and tutor Chris Weir uses maps, period photographs and other historical sources to explore how and why Nottingham changed in Victorian times. The course will also explore some key personalities of the time and how inner suburbs like The Park and Forest Fields changed from open spaces into urban communities.



History of the Music Hall and The Artists who
Performed There!

We will look at how the music hall came about through words music and film. It's development from the pubs of the 1830s to the thousands of buildings around the UK. How it also sprung from a working class entertainment to the sophisticated variety theatres like the Nottingham Empire. It's sad decline and moving to the working men's and socials clubs in the 1970s will also be covered. It survives today via its final return to it's origins the pub in the 1990s and beyond.



Nottingham Rebels - The story of the Luddites, Chartists,
Bread Riots & Others!

Nottingham people have not taken to the rule of authority easily. They have always been ready to speak their minds and take to the streets if their grievances have not been met. We will be looking at some local protests large and small that have taken place through out the centuries, in and a round the city. We will see how the authorities reacted and how did the people responded as well as what were the long and short term outcomes of these protests. We will see how they still affect us today



Great Artists You May Never Have Heard Of!

This course will examine the paintings of a variety of artists who are largely unknown today, despite producing high quality work. They come from several countries in Europe and some of the painted works were much admired by their contemporaries-and they are often still in the their own countries. Some of those contemporaries were also ignored for many years and have been rediscovered, so the artists we'll be looking at may one day be brought back into mainstream consciousness. We'll also look at some American artists from the turn of the Twentieth century until more recent years who deserve to be known better, and painters from "unfashionable" countries in Europe (as far as the art world is concerned) - Ireland, Scandinavia and Slavonic Countries...



## DAY PROGRAMME History

Musicals: Strife, Low lifeand High Society

A look at history through musicals, including Fiddler on the Roof, Guys and Dolls, Chicago, Singin in the Rain, Gypsy, Miss Saigon and others. Also covered will be musicals focused on the history behind industrial issues - there are a surprising number of these! We'll examine political, cultural and social issues that form the basis of the plots and how the historical contexts in which they were written have often affected views of history portrayed in the shows themselves. We will also consider in particular the life and career of Cole Porter, whose background and lifestyle contrasted markedly with those of the mainly Jewish composers and writers behind some of the best known musicals.

Britain In Ireland From the Act of Union to the Irish Free State
Fridays 10.15-12.15pm

8 week course £72.00

The Act of Union passed by the British parliament in January 1801 was intended to solve "the Irish question" once and for all but failed, largely because of British backtracking on promises of Catholic emancipation. We'll look at the context of Anglo-Norman, English and British attempts to subjugate Ireland in previous centuries and how close some rebellions in Ireland came to overthrowing English/British control. We'll also look at events in the 19th Century following the enactment of the Act of Union, particularly Daniel O'Connell's campaign to achieve Catholic representation at Westminster; the rise of revolutionary groups during and after the Great Famine, which hardened attitudes in Ireland because of the British response to it; Gladstone's plans for home rule; and the growth of peaceful Irish nationalism and a revival of Irish culture at the turn of the 20th Century. We'll see how British reaction to the Easter Rising of 1916 ended support in Ireland for Home Rule and the war of Independence followed. The treaty to end this war, the result of a meeting in London between the British government and Irish representatives, led to the Irish civil war, tearing communities and families apart. We'll see how Eamon de Valera, one of the main opponents of the Treaty, eventually came to dominate Irish politics and oversaw the adoption of a new constitution in 1937, effectively creating and Irish republic and largely bringing an end to British involvement in Southern Ireland.

This course delves into the complex history of the Vietnam War, examining the roots of the conflict in French colonialism, the rise of Ho Chi Minh's communist movement, and the escalating US involvement during the Cold War; exploring key battles, political decision-making, the impact on Vietnamese civilians, the domestic anti-war movement in America, and the lasting consequences of the war on both Vietnam and the international stage."

So far we have looked at Philip Larkin, Simon Armitage, Sylvia Plath, Clive James, W B Yeats, D H Lawrence and Carol Ann Duffy, and our next choices promise to be just as eclectic. You don't need to be an expert or a dedicated poetry lover to join us, just someone with an open mind who enjoys words, ideas and the company of a friendly group. Poems to be studied will be provided weekly in booklet form.

The invention of the steam powered locomotive and the very rapid development of the railway network resulted in huge social changes. For example, the opening up of seaside resorts and the rapid transport of goods and raw materials to and from the growing industrial cities. It also created an entirely new way of looking at the passing scene. The swiftness of trains caused passengers to see the world in a series of glimpses, something reflected in art and prose. In this course we shall look at a number of poems, books and descriptive writings which reflect the changes wrought by the railway and the effect it had on our vision of the country.

In this course we will discuss about ten of his essays most of which can be found int the Oxford Classics edition of Orwell's Selected Essays. All can be found on-line. Details of which essays to read will be supplied well in advance so that you can mull them over before we meet. The course will encourage open and free discussion and no previous knowledge is needed.

# Leisure Learning at the Institute DAY PROGRAMME Philosophy & Politics

Mondays 2.30-4.30pm Starts 12th May 26th May is a Holiday (Bettina Lange) 8 week course £72.00

There is increasing concern that democracy is 'in crisis' in Europe and beyond. In this course Philosophy, Psychology and Political Science will be used to identify risks and indicate constructive responses to them.

The course will cover: 1. the meaning of 'crisis' 2. what is in crisis - a short overview of different interpretations of 'democracy' 3. evidence of distrust in politicians and the democratic political system 4. who engages with politics, who does not and what kind of politics do they participate in (from parliamentary democracy to protest actions) 5. authoritarian attitudes and how best to respond to them (especially Karen Stenner's work) 6. the relationship between conspiracy theories and democracy.
